Led by Autistic self-advocates and other field experts, these sessions are designed to provide valuable knowledge and support to our community.

Our commitment to addressing the critical needs of our members has been evident through several key initiatives. The expansion of our Housing and Employment services and the introduction of the Sensory Experiences Rental Program have significantly enhanced the support we provide. Additionally, our active participation in numerous resource fairs and the success of our discussion groups further demonstrate our dedication to fostering connection and support within the Autistic community.

This year has also highlighted an increasing demand for our services. Our League program saw a remarkable 65% rise in participants, emphasizing the urgent need for expanded adult services and opportunities. Additionally, our Pantry Program distributed 1,483 hampers to individuals facing food insecurity, reflecting another area of growing demand that we are committed to addressing.

As we enter the final year of our strategic plan, we are focused on building on our successes and ensuring the sustainability of our services. The ongoing increase in demand presents both challenges and opportunities, motivating us to continually adapt and innovate. This pivotal year will be crucial in consolidating our achievements, refining our strategies, and preparing for future growth. We are committed to ensuring that our programs meet the evolving needs of our community while laying a strong foundation for continued support, inclusivity, and equity.

We are excited to bring you insights from Autistic self-advocates and other field experts, ensuring that each session delivers valuable, firsthand knowledge and expertise. Alongside these new offerings, Autism Edmonton continues to provide foundational courses like Autism 101 and Autism 201, as well as specialized training in Abuse Prevention and Response Protocol (APRP) and Non-Violent Crisis Intervention (NVCI).

CHILDREN'S AUTISM COLLABORATIVE TEAM (CACT)

At Autism Edmonton, we proudly facilitate the Children's Autism Collaborative Team (CACT), a dedicated group of professionals committed to supporting autistic children and their families. This collaborative effort brings together experts and agencies from across the Autistic community to engage in open, roundtable discussions. These sessions are designed to share knowledge and resources, covering a range of essential topics such as respite care, Program Unit Funding (PUF). Specialized Services, and Behavioral Developmental Supports.

Our primary goal is to foster an environment where agencies can exchange insights on the available programming for autistic children, explore challenges and solutions in service delivery, and streamline the referral process to ensure families receive the support they need. Together, we are building a stronger network of care for the autism community.

TRANSITIONS RESOURCE COMMITTEE

Autism Edmonton proudly leads the Transitions Resource Committee, a collaborative group dedicated to supporting individuals as they transition into adulthood. This committee brings together representatives from various organizations to connect, share insights, and discuss new programming that specifically addresses the needs of voung people aged 16-17 as they prepare for adulthood. Through regular presentations and discussions, the group stays informed about emerging programs and services. With new participants and organizations continually joining, the Transitions Resource Committee plays a crucial role in ensuring a seamless transition to adulthood for individuals in the Autistic community.

LAUNCH OF AUTISM EDMONTON SENSORY EXPERIENCES RENTAL PROGRAM

Autism Edmonton proudly launched our Sensory
Experiences Rental Program. These thoughtfully designed spaces provide a calming and supportive environment, making them ideal for events, schools, and community gatherings. By making these spaces accessible, we are advancing our commitment to community inclusion, ensuring that everyone, regardless of their sensory needs, can fully participate in shared experiences. During its inception the Sensory Experiences Rental Program had appearances at the Maskwacis Education Schools Commission Graduation Powwow, Folk Fest, a Realtors Open, the Sampson Cree Powwow, Artisan Markets, the 2024 Autism Alberta Alliance Event, and so much more!
